## **Differences between Consonants and Vowels**

- 1. Consonants are the sounds produced with the passage of air impeded at different points in the vocal tract. Vowels are sounds produced with a free passage of air.
- 2. Consonants are classified into <u>voiced</u> and <u>voiceless</u>. Vowels are classified into <u>long</u> and <u>short</u>.
- 3. Vowels are described according to:
  - a. Length of the vowel (Long or short).
  - b. The vertical distance between the roof of the tongue and the roof of the mouth.( Close, close mid open mid and open).
  - c. The part of the tongue which is raised against the roof of the mouth.( front, central, back).
  - d. The shape of the lips (spread, neutral, or rounded).
- 4. Languages do not have the same number of consonants and vowels.
- 5. The distribution of these sounds is not the same in all languages.
- 6. What is a phoneme in one language can be realized into different allophones in another.
- 7. Languages do not show the same distribution of consonants and vowels. The sequence of consonant clusters in English is different from Arabic, for example.
- 8. What is a consonant in one language can be a vowel in another.
