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Vowels in English

All first year students should know that the main focus during the second semester will be devoted to vowels, dipthongs and triphthongs in English.

<u>Vowels</u> can be defined as the sounds produced with a free passage of air. They fall into two main types:


- A. Long vowels.
- **B. Short vowels.**

There are 12 short and long vowels in English. There are 8 diphthongs and triphthongs.

<u>The diphthong</u> is a combination of 2 vowels but <u>the triphthong</u> is a combination of 3 vowels.

Cardinal VowelsDefinition of Cardinal Vowels:

A standard reference system. They refer to the range of vowels that human vocal apparatus can make.

Characteristics of the Cardinal Vowels:


- They are used as reference points to describe the English vowels and the vowels of many European languages.
- 2. They do not belong to any particular language.
- 3. They are characterized with extreme vowel quality.
- 5. They were first devised by Daniel Johns.

- 6. They are peripheral (located on the edges) (ends) of the quadrilateral (diagram).
- 7. They are eight cardinal vowels.
- 8. They are enclosed between square brackets. [].
